Welcome to the Spring edition of the Saltfleetby Newsletter. Once again with articles from residents and members of the Parish Council, compiled and edited by me, Chris Stone.

This edition contains a variety of articles and puzzles along with contact details of a selection of local businesses, not specifically Saltfleetby but local, who answered my call on the Saltfleetby Chat and Sell Facebook page. Not being a particular fan of Facebook myself, I currently administer the site since the departure from the village of Clare who originally created the page. As I write this, we are approaching 450 members. Other Saltfleetby Facebook sites are also available, but I fully appreciate not everyone uses Facebook, however it exists for those who are interested.

As ever when preparing a newsletter certain assumptions are likely to be made that come publication day, turn out to be incorrect. My statement in the winter edition "by the time you read this, all four solar speed signs will be fully operational" was, as it turned out, to be extremely hopeful....! Several factors, not least very wobbly posts installed by LCC contractors, added to the delay in getting all four signs up and running. Data obtained from both stealth and fully visible units can be found later in this issue. I think it proves the point that being presented with your speed in large numbers at the side of the road does in general, help reduce speed. Speeding has been a constant concern of residents for a great number of years. It was documented in Parish Council minutes year after year, finally a successful use of community wind farm funds seems to be helping ease the problem. It is not a cure, but the figures prove it does help reduce speed, despite what the doubters have said. A list of where some of your windfarm money has been spent can be found on pages 28& 29 It was also raised at a Parish Council meeting that my statement "installation of the speed signs has been done voluntarily" was untrue, as they had been paid for by the wind farm fund. Yes, everyone knew the wind farm paid for the solar signs, it was well documented in PC minutes. The signs and solar panels were fitted to the posts and set up using dedicated software by volunteers. That's all. Volunteers. There was no cost involved. The same can be said for the installation of the splendid new Parish Council notice board and dog waste bin, erected totally free of charge by volunteers.

The Angel Inn

The history of Saltfleetby St Peter's lost Victorian Pub



Situated on the Main Road just over half a mile east of the crossroads, the Angel Inn was a thriving public house for about a 100 years or more. It was used as a meeting place where the local Lords of the Manor would collect annual rent due from their tenants. It also hosted meetings of local landowners regarding the payment of tithes to St Peter's parish clergy. Henry Hewitt Plumtree and his wife Jane (nee Gilbert) from Salmonby ran the pub in the 1820s, their eldest son Henry was born here in 1827 and baptised at St Peter's church in January 1828. In 1830 they moved to Tetford where they ran a Butcher's shop and had a further 5 children. The Angel was then briefly occupied by Abraham Hay from Great Carlton and his wife Elizabeth (nee Pogson) from Horncastle, who had previousy been publicans in Tetford. They moved on to be proprieter of public houses in Holton le Clay and Tetney. Mr Hay's brother, David continued to live in a cottage in Saltfleetby St Clements. The next tenant of the pub was Mr Drewry, before it was let to the Denniss family in 1833 who remained as innkeepers for the next 38 years.


Thomas Denniss was born in Beesby, Lincolnshire in 1798, and moved with his family to Saltfleetby St Clement when he was about 9 years old. He married Frances Cotton from Louth at St Peter's Church in 1824. Their children Henry, Edward, Charles, George and Frances were all born in Saltfleetby and grew up at the

Angel. They also farmed the adjoining land, initially 10 acres, aquiring more, until their farm covered an area of 30 acres by 1871.

Auctions of local farmland, property and commodities were frequently held at the Angel, conducted by solicitors from Louth. Public meetings were also held there to discuss local issues such as the the inclosure of Saltfleetby North Ings in 1836

Mr and Mrs Denniss also hosted sporting events and dinners at the Angel, with such attractions as pigeon shoots, donkey races and foot races to win generous prizes!

Mrs Denniss's older sister, Miss Elizabeth Cotton, lived with them from the 1850s and assisted with the pub. Both ladies were well-known and admired for their cooking and skills as hostesses, making the Angel a favourite venue for social gatherings.

These included annual meetings of Saltfleetby's Bachelor Society, which ran for over 20 years . Meetings of the village's farmers and tradesmen were also held annually. which included enjoying a "first - rate" supper prepared by Mrs Denniss , before the toasts were given .

Bachelors' Society.—It appears that the bachelors, and another class called the "Fumblers," of Saltfleetby, have formed themselves into a society for the purpose of meeting together once a year, when an opportunity is given them either for congratulation or condolence, as these worthies may consider their several cases may deserve. Thursday the 2nd inst. was the day on which the last anniversary of the society was celebrated, on which occasion about thirty members and friends partook of an excellent dinner at Mr. Denniss,' the Angel inn. After dinner the usual loyal and complimentary toasts were given, speeches on the virtues and blessings of celibacy were delivered, and the hilarity of the entertainment was kept up until a very late hour ; so very late, that none but *bona-fide* bachelors would have dreamt of stopping.

They were buried at Great Carlton, St John the Baptist churchyard. The Angel was then taken over by the **Barker family**.

William Barker was born in Saltfleetby St Clement in 1813, he married Mary Houltby from Greetham in 1839. The couple lived in Scamblesby and Asterby where they had a large family of 11 children. In 1872 William and Mary were publicans at the Angel Inn before passing the business on to their son and retiring to South Cockerington. William died in 1892 age 79, and Mary in 1899 age 86.

-William Barker, of the Angel Inn, Saltfleetby, All Saints, was charged with permitting drunkenness on the 8th ult. Needham, a small farmer, was proved to have been in the house seven hours, and was in drink when he went there. P.C. Thurlby proved the case. Fined 14s. 6d., including costs.-

Barker Evison Smith, Angel P.H. & farmer 1896 Kelly's Directory of Lincolnshire

By 1881 Evision Smith Barker was running the Angel with his wife Eliza (nee Enderby) from Kirmond le Mire, Lincolnshire. The couple lived at Gayton le Wold, then Pinchbeck before moving to Saltfleetby with their 5 children: Alice, William, Eliza, Jane and Jessie. They had a further two children at Saltfleetby: Charles in 1882 and James in 1884. A family business, their children helped run the pub and serve customers as well as run the small ajoining farm

The Barkers were initially tenants at the pub. At this time it was owned by the Bishop of Melbourne, Australia: The Right Reverend Field Flowers Goe, whose family owned property in area.

The son of the Mayor of Louth, a solicitor, also called Field Flowers Goe, Rev. Goe was born in Louth in 1832 and grew up on Bridge Street. He attended King Edward VI school, then Hertford College, Oxford. He was ordained a priest in 1858 and began his career working as curate at Hull. Here he met and married Emma Rogers Hurst from Doncaster. They lived in Sunderland and Bloomsbury, London where he took up posts as rector in the Church of England.

Rev. Field Flowers Goe (1832-1910), the Bishop of Melbourne and owner of the Angel Inn, Saltfleetby

They moved to Australia when he was appointed the 3rd Anglican Bishop of Melbourne in 1886. During this time Emma suffered a long illness, passing away in 1901. There is a memorial plaque dedicated to her in Melbourne Cathedral. Rev. Goe retired soon after his wife's death and returned to England, living in Wimbledon. He died in June 1910 and is buried in Louth cemetery.

Following the death of Rev. Goe, the pub, with over nine acres of pasture and arable land, was put up for sale and bought by the innkeeper, Evision Barker for £545

In 1911 James Fowler Barker was running the pub alongside his parents. Eliza died in Saltfleetby in 1912, age 70. Evision retired to live in Louth where he died in 1920 age 77, having passed his pub on to his son, James.

James Barker joined the army in the First World War and served as a driver with the Royal Army Service Corps at Park Royal in London . His civilian profession was listed as "innkeeper" . I n January 1919 he was discharged after sustaining an accidental injury of a broken ankle.

Returning to Saltfleetby , he continued to run the Angel Inn . Its licence was reported as lapsed in February 1922 , and it closed permanently at around this time


At Louth County Brewster Sessions yesterday, Superintendent Skinner reported that there were 23 licensed houses in the division, or one to 422 of the population. The licences of the "Angel" at Saltfleetby and the "Raven" at Louth Park had lapsed. Five persons had been proceeded against for drunkenness, and four were convicted. The existing licences were renewed.

The Sheffield Daily Telegraph, 9th February 1922

James went to live on North End Lane where he worked as a general farm labourer. Later in life he used a wheelchair after illness resulted in the amputation of a leg. He lived with his niece Olive North , a poultry farmer, on North End Lane . He died here in 1950 age 67

Farmer Mr C. Winter occupied the old Angel Inn building as a private residence in the 1940s. Here he kept Friesian cattle, ducks and other livestock. In November 1947 a sale took place of Mr Winter's stock , by auction at the Old Angel Inn

The building later became derelict and was sold for demolition in January 1972, advertised for £700 or nearest offer

The Angel bungalow was built in place of the old pub on The Main Road. Today the only thing still remaining from the inn is the old lamp post, in front of the bungalow.





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
The new speed signs, purchased using community wind farm funds, have now been in operation for well over 6 weeks. Two units have proved to be extremely useful in slowing the traffic through the footpath roadworks as we were able to adjust the indicated maximum speed to keep the construction area as safe as possible. You will have noticed a maximum of either 20 mph through the cones or 30 mph approaching the traffic lights.

This however has had a bearing on the results obtained. Consequently, the following results have only been downloaded from the unit near the Outgang. Incoming vehicles are obviously the vehicles that are picked up by the radar when approaching the sign displaying your speed; outgoing, are driving away from the unit when no speed is displayed but is recorded.



With unit in stealth mode, incoming vehicles were recorded but the speed was not displayed. These figures were obtained from 02-02-24 to 13-02-24

With the sign in place appearing as if it were not working, around 37% of vehicles were travelling faster than the 40 limit. Please remember this was a very small sample taken in one area due to the continuing roadworks. The figures obtained once the speed was displayed are from a much greater group but again, only one area. It is hoped to give a more detailed analysis of the



results in the next edition of the magazine when the footpath work will have been completed.

The test results from an Archer test on North End Lane back in July 2023 can be seen in the table below. I hope this is fairly selfexplanatory but basically the average speed is within the current speed limit.

Please note that this list comprises of grants from the Windfarm monies to external organisations within the community. The Parish Council have also been able to fund running costs for grass cutting, newletters and purchase of speed awareness signs etc from these funds.

INFORMATION ABOUT SALTFLEETBY BILLIARD CLUB - THE ORIGINAL TITLE

This information is from John Harrison, who moved at aged 7 to Sturdys Farm, Saltfleetby in 1947. I was a member of the Billiard Club from aged 14 at which time the Club was located in a building at White House Farm, opposite to Sturdys Farm. At the time the farm was owned by Mr Tommy Jaques. Members of the Club paid a subscription and for the use of the table.

The Club had a number of locations -

Originally, it was based in a building beside the village shop owned by the Kidd sisters. (This is the same site where the village shop was situated, until relatively recently, but is now a house).

Subsequently it moved to a building adjacent to Moat Hall, on the righthand side of the drive. Mr Sid Richardson told me the history of the Club beginnings when I joined in 1954. Later it moved to White House Farm. The Club Teams played in the local leagues. It was well supported by both players and their families. At home league matches refreshments (tea and biscuits) were provided by Freshney Larder (village postmaster) and his daughter, Marjorie. They lived nearby at the Post Office (which was next to the drive to Saltfleetby Station Yard. Initially, Freshney delivered the mail on his bike, and Marjorie did this for many years, in all weathers. As a younger member it was my responsibility to go in early on match nights to light the coke stove and iron the table. At that time the Club had only a 3/4 table. I took over this responsibility from Mr Carter Enderby, who lived in Drovers' Cottage. The Billiard Club and table moved to the Chapel. I believe the chapel closed in 1961 It was originally the St. Peter Centenary Primitive Methodist Church. the background to this is as follows:

Herbert Lusby, a farmer from Beulah Farm Saltfleetby, purchased the closed Chapel for £1,000, intending to use it for storing machinery. His brother Arthur Lusby suggested that it would be ideal for use as the Billiard Club.

Editors note: This is page one of three that was read out during the Snooker Club AGM. I am not in a position to print the remainder at this time. Details regarding ownership of the building are currently under investigation.
