St Peter's Church



St Peter's is an ecumenical church shared equally between the Church of England and the Methodist Church.

The Church is open for worship every Sunday at 10:30am. The format of the services alternates each week between the two faiths. The church has been on its current site for nearly 150 years and there has been Christian worship in the village for over 900 years. Sadly, the size of the congregation is at present very small and the future of regular services is in jeopardy. If you would wish Christian worship to continue in the village, please make the effort to attend church services on Sundays.

Whist its primary function is a place of Christian worship, the church, is being used more and more by the community. Last year several events were held at the church and the support received was very encouraging. Ticketed events were sold out with the church at capacity.

In February 2025, the kitchen was inspected by East Lindsey District Council and a Food Hygiene Rating of 5 was obtained. This is the highest Food Hygiene Level awarded. Our thanks to Stuart Leeder for all his hard work over the past few months and to the Energie Kontor Windfarm fund for awarding a grant covering a small portion of the work.

Regular events at the church include the Chat and Craft Group on Mondays, the Art Group on Wednesdays, a Coffee Morning is held on the first Wednesday of each month, except January, and Charities Bingo is held on the last Sunday of every month.

Fund-Raising in Saltfleetby During World War II

Entertainments Committee Whist Drives

Since the early 1930s, Saltfleetby's Entertainments Committee had been arranging numerous village events such as summer Fete and Sports Days, concerts and New Year's Eve Socials in the schoolroom. Two veterans of the First World War were chairman and secretary, and acted as Master of Ceremonies (MC) at their events. Saltfleetby stationmaster George Ingham, had served in France in the Royal Army Medical Corps. Percy Epton, a market gardener on North End Lane, saw action in the Middle East as a member of the Lincolnshire Yeomanry. The committee were lent use of Orchard Bungalow on the Main Road, by retired Methodist evangelist Miss Frances Fletcher, of The Retreat, who owned cottages in the villages that she rented out. Here they held numerous whist drives on Thursdays, to raise money to provide comforts for members of HM Forces.

The village was shocked when George Ingham died suddenly in March 1942, age 64 after a short illness. Well-known in Saltfleetby, he also established and contributed to other local voluntary organisations such as the Village Billiards League, and Social Club.

Women's Voluntary Service

The WVS were established nationally in 1938 to help with air raid precautions when extra assistance may have been needed. Their work expanded to all kinds of duties such as first aid, knitting items for servicemen, collecting and distributing aid.

The Saltfleetby WVS was established in October 1940 by a number of local women, including Mrs Gwendolen Aley, the wife of the headmaster of the village school, Cecil Aley who had served in the RAF in the First World War. Miss Annie Stones, sister of village blacksmiths Samuel and Harry Stones, was also an active member in her 70s.

In July 1941 they gave £12 10s to the Red Cross to provide 10s parcels for prisoners of war. They raised the money from whist drives, for which over 40 prizes had been given by members and friends.

In the first eight months since their founding, they had raised £38 13s 6d (about £2,300 in today's value) from weekly whist drives, where all prizes were donated. This was used to buy 1,212 ounces of wool, which they knitted into garments for men on minesweepers. They had made 43 pairs of minesweepers' gloves, and turned 50 yards of material provided by the American Red Cross into garments for people in the bombed areas. They collected large quantities of second-hand clothing for people affected by bombing. They had also made twenty-three pairs of curtains for a canteen at a searchlight camp (at Sea View on the Saltfleetby coast). The ladies took it in turn to do the darning for the men at the camp.

A whist drive in May 1942 raised £6 for St. Dunstan's, the charity supporting blind veterans.

Mr and Mrs Aley left the village to move to Rattlesden in Suffolk, where Cecil took up a new teaching job. In July 1942, after an event demonstrating *mint bottling*, Miss Stones presented Mrs Aley with a leaving gift of an electric boiling ring and electric fire, in appreciation of the work she has done as organiser of the WVS since its formation.

A series of Whist Drives organised by the WVS, Home Guard and National Fire Service (NFS) resulted in £138 12s sent in April 1943 to Saltfleetby Comforts Fund, YMCA, British Seamans's Society, Merchant Navy Comforts Fund, Aid to Russia Fund, Marsh Nursing Association, WVS Wool Fund, NFS Benevolent Fund, and RAF Benevolent Fund.

Penny-A-Week

The British Red Cross and St John's launched their *Penny-a-Week* campaign in 1939, to raise money to fund their humanitarian work during the war, including sending food parcels to prisoner of war camps and soldiers overseas. Based on voluntary contributions from wage earners, giving a penny from their weekly wage, and also collections and house calls. In Saltfleetby the WVS ladies led by Mrs Dorothy Taylor of the Old Orchard, Main Road, managed to collect a quarterly total of over £11 for the fund throughout the war. Mrs Taylor and the WVS continued their good work long after the end of the war.

Garden Fetes

In August 1941, the WVS held a Garden Fete at Saltfleetby House, then owned by railway clerk Jim Luck and his wife Annie, who had held charity events there before the war. The proceeds amounted to £22 17s 3d which was divided between the Red Cross Prisoners of War Fund, the Lord Mayer of London Air Raid Relief Fund, and the Saltfleetby WVS Wool Fund.

Saltfleetby House was later in use by the army as a place to billet soldiers and use the grounds for target practice.

The Auxiliary Fire Service, run by local volunteers, merged with the National Fire Service in 1941.

In Saltfleetby their station was in front of Vicker's Fishing Ponds on the Main Road. It utilised an old warehouse to house equipment (site of the former village shop). This area of the Fisheries became a location to hold fund-raising fetes and sports days. In July 1943 money was raised here for the NFS Benevolent and Welfare Fund.

The Saltfleetby team won the *Tug-of-War* at Skidbrooke's 1942 fete organised by The Civil Defence Service in aid of the Red Cross. Other sports for children and adults included a *fancy-dress race, one mile cycle race, slow cycle and sack race*. £27 was raised over the day.

In June 1944 the annual WVS fete was held at the Fisheries. Mrs Luck judged the competition for children's *decorated cycles with wild flowers*. Other competitions included *shooting*, *skittles*, *bowling for a pig*, *ball game*, *treasure hunt*, *red white and blue*, *tank* and *darts*.

Percy Epton conducted a sale of goods, and there was a dance later at Sea View. The net proceeds for the day's events came to £91.

Dances at Sea View

A wooden recreation hut was put up for use of the searchlight company based at Sea View. This was also used for fund-raising dances, organised by local women. In March 1944 Miss Grace Holloway and Mrs Kathleen Graves (nee Brown) organised an event in aid of the Red Cross. The MC was Sgt Jones, items were donated as prizes. Misses Margory Larder and Edna Richardson were in charge of competitions. Home Guard Captain Jim Odlin conducted the sale of gifts.

RED CROSS.—A dance in the "Sea View" Recreation Hut for the Red Cross was organised by Miss Grace Holloway and Mrs. S Graves, and Sgt. Jones was M.C. Pillow cases (given by Mrs. Campbell), won by Mrs. G. Vickers; groceries, A. C. Ingamells; fancy mats (Mrs. Campbell), Mrs. A. Stubbs, returned for sale. Those in charge of competitions were Misses M. Larder and E. Richardson. The sale of gifts was conducted by Capt. J. E. Odlin, and refreshments were in charge of Mrs. A. Stubbs, Mrs. Wells .Mrs .W .H. Stubbs and Mrs. Campbell. The sale realised £7, and the total of £30 included donations.

Louth Standard 11th March 1944

A total of £30 was raised. Kathleen Graves organised further events at the hut with many contributions from locals. A dance in April 1944 raised £15 for the Red Cross, and £14 in June 1944.

After the war the recreation hut remained disused at Sea View, until it was bought by the village and moved to the Main Road, where it served as Saltfleetby Village Hall for decades.

Home Guard at the Prussian Queen

The village pub closed to became the headquarters of the Saltfleetby Home Guards. Made up of local volunteers led by many veterans of the First World War. James Edward Odlin of Poplar Farm, who had served in the trenches in France as a member of the Lincolnshire Regiment, became the captain. As well as local defence duties and training they also organised fund-raising events.

Lindsey 9th (Louth) Battalion Home Guard commanding officer, Lieutenant-Colonel Oscar Dixon of Kenwick Hall, Louth, granted permission for the Prussian Queen to be lent for occasional social events to help the war effort.

At a whist drive in November 1943 in the Prussian Queen, Captain Odlin was MC. Several gifts of hares, chickens and produce were sold, raising £9 18s, giving a total of £20 0s 1d for Red Cross Funds.

In December 1943 Capt. Odlin and Mr G. T. Jaques organised a whist drive in which £10 15s was raised for the Red Cross Agriculture Fund. Among the prizes won that night were soap, envelopes, a hare, whisky, two partridges, a chicken and rabbits. Another one organised by Capt. Odlin and Mr Jaques in December 1944 raised £16 for Red Cross Funds.

Salvage Collection

The Louth Rural District Council (RDC) organised a salvage campaign for the collection of wastepaper, metals and other waste products which could be put to good use for the war effort. Extra incentive was given by setting villages in competition with each other to see which could donate the most. In August 1941 they reported that Withern was in first place with 7½lbs of salvage per head of the population. Saltfleetby was second with 6lbs. Third place was shared by Aby, Claythorpe and Belleau with 5½lbs each.

Collecting depots were set up throughout the area, with volunteers assisting in the scheme. A large space was set apart in the forecourt of the Louth RDC offices for the reception of salvage, which was filled to overflowing, especially on market days.

Louth Rural Area Good Neighbour Scheme for Leytonstone

Many useful household items such as beds, mattresses, pillows, sheets, blankets, cups and saucers, glass and cooking utensils, teacloths and cushions etc, were donated by the people of Saltfleetby and surrounding villages. The appeal was organised in March 1945 by regional WVS member Mrs Doreen Palethorpe of Claythorpe Manor, Alford, to help the people of Leytonstone in London who had suffered heavy bomb damage.

Victory in Europe Day



Lincolnshire Echo 7th May 1945

Twelve days after VE day, on Whit Monday 1945, a village fete was held at The Fisheries. As well as the usual games, it also included a fancydress competition, Victory Cake and port wine, *flags*, *guess the dog's name* (it was "Vic"), and *guess the name of the doll*, which no-one guessed correctly, so it was sold. There was a *bring-and-buy stall* and an auction sale conducted by Percy Epton. Refreshments were served during the evening. The net proceeds amounted to over £100 (worth £5,500 today) which was donated to the Services Comforts Fund.



Rural Crime

Hello all. Everyone is probably well aware of the amount of crime in Saltfleetby and the surrounding areas. It's varied but mainly break ins, theft of property, fuel oil and vehicles, hare coursing, livestock theft and trespass. It's shocking actually how much is going on and even with social media, it's surprising how many are not aware.

A few weeks ago, several properties were targeted. This resulted in damage to buildings and a lot of property stolen including tools, horse riding equipment, a gun and ammunition (we understand to be an air rifle). It was definitely organised and targeted to those individuals. This is becoming common place and is of concern. More so when we know that the police don't have the time or resources to carry out preventative policing and will only attend an active situation. This we all know from experience is either too late or not at all. Therefore everyone is getting frustrated, angry, worried, scared, and now lots of discussion about what we would do individually to protect what we have worked so hard for. The criminals carrying out these crimes are becoming more organised and know that the lack of policing is working to their advantage.

They come onto properties acting as mobile mechanics, looking for someone, handing out business cards etc etc. This is so if their DNA is found after a break in etc, they have an excuse for being there. This is just an example of how they work. I have heard that the police struggle to get a prosecution on these grounds.

There has been a lot of sightings and CCTV footage of certain individuals walking around yards and back gardens when they shouldn't be there. So the day after the said night when all the break ins occurred, I rang the police. I was put through to the control room and then to someone else. I was advised to get a public meeting set up. I can only guess that they struggle themselves and so if the public speak up then maybe more could be done.

I have spoken to other parish counsellors, local and county counsellors and they have all said they will get involved in some way. Currently a meeting is being organised to get an action plan together on how best to proceed and include everyone. Then hopefully a public meeting soon in which we can have our say and look how we all can put in better preventative measures. Years ago we used to have village watch and other schemes which did work.

It's better to do something than nothing as it's only going to get worse and someone will get hurt as a result.

For now keep the communication up on Facebook and WhatsApp groups etc and make it known if your a victim of crime. This way we can all be on our guard. And obviously contact the police of anything suspicious.

A TRUE CRIME STORY FROM VICTORIAN SALTFLEETBY Highway Robbery 1876

On Friday 26th May 1876, 39-year-old Mr Charles Needler, a farmer from Saltfleetby, went to Louth to sell some livestock. He set off from home carrying the sum of about £7. At Louth Stock Market he received £37 6s for the sale of two beasts, then made payments of £26. At about 5 or 6pm he set off for home, riding in the conveyance of his neighbour, farmer William Housham of Saltfleetby.

On reaching Saltfleetby St Peter at about 8pm they called into the Angel Inn on the Main Road. At this time a new railway was being built connecting Louth with Mablethorpe via a new station at Saltfleetby, which opened the following year. Several "navvies" (navigators), manual workers constructing the new railway line, were also drinking in the Angel that night. They asked Mr Needler if he would treat them. On pulling out his purse to pay for some beer, 24-year-old navvy Henry Holmes looked over his shoulder and said "I'll tell you what, you carry a good purse, old boy", to which Needler replied "Yes, I've a good purse, but I'm sorry to say I've but little in it". They carried on further conversation until Needler said he must go.

At about 9.30pm Holmes and two other men left the pub, first asking Needler which way he was going, offering to walk with him as they were going the same way until the brick yard (now the fishing pond near Marshlands). About ten minutes later Mr Needler left. He called after them, wishing to walk in their company. About 50 yards past the pub, he heard a whistle behind him. He caught up with them, they exchanged a few words before he overtook them about 400 yards from the pub. At this point one of the men came suddenly behind him, seized him by the neck and pulled him to the ground. Someone seized hold of his legs, but he couldn't tell who. Needler shouted out "man, what are you going to do?", to which he replied "Where's your money you b_____, I know you have some; give it up or I will knock your brains out with this stone". Needler said "for God's sake spare my life if you take all I have". His purse containing £16 15s 7d (worth about £2,000 today) was taken from him, along with his watch and chain. The assailant said "if you ever split one word, I shall murder you". The other two men stood about 7 yards away. As soon as his purse was taken, all three ran away.

Mr Needler shouted out "I am robbed" and tried to run after the men, but they were gone. The police were informed of the incident early the following morning. Shortly afterwards Henry Homes was arrested in Grimoldby and identified by Mr Needler as being one of the three.

Monday whilst working on the East Coast Railway. Both men denied complicity in the robbery, but were committed for trial at the assizes.

They were sent to be held at Lincoln Gaol (in the castle grounds) on 2nd June while they awaited their trial.

The third man, that they called "Ginger", real name George Henry Upton, a 21-year-old agricultural labourer from Covenham, remained at large. Upton's description was circulated nationally in the Police Gazette:

ROBBERY AND LARCENY FROM THE PERSON.

Description of GEORGE HENRY UPTON, charged with stealing from the person of Charles Needles, of Saltfleetby, St. Peters : a Purse, containing £16 in Gold and Silver : he is 21 years of age, 5 feet 5 inches high, red hair, sandy whiskers, freckled face, walks erect, and surly looking ; has a brother residing at Hillsborough, near Sheffield. Information to be given to Superintendent Thorsby, Louth, Lincolnshire, who holds a warrant for his apprehension.— Bow-street, June 2.

The Police Gazette, Tuesday 6th June 1876

Holmes and Capes were tried at Spilsby on 4th July before Magistrate Cornelius Parker of Louth. Local witnesses gave evidence including Superintendent Thoresby of Louth and Pc Smith, who apprehended the prisoners. Mr Barker, the landlord of the Angel, confirmed that the two prisoners, Upton and Charles Needler were drinking together there that night. 19-year-old Mary Frances Dennis, who lived on the Main Road between the Angel Inn and Saltfleetby House, stated that she heard parties walking fast past her house between nine and ten on the night in question, but could not tell who they were.

The defence made the case that Holmes and Capes were only charged with being accessories, and had not actually committed the offence. It was suggested that Upton, was the actually thief, but he had escaped while the prisoners had not done so. Perhaps the person that Needler said held his legs was likely the same person that he heard mysteriously whistling in the background earlier? It was argued that there was no justification for conviction, and had Upton been captured, Holmes and Capes would not have been put in this position. Capes had nothing to do with it, and Upton had threatened Holmes that he would "smash his head if he interfered".

The jury retired, and after 25 minutes, returned to the court declaring a verdict of "Not Guilty" against both of the prisoners. One said to the jury "You have spoken the truth; we are not guilty of it".

On 11th July, George Upton was finally apprehended, in Driffield by Pc Swaby who charged him with the robbery. He was searched, and a purse containing £7 was found upon him, as well as a watch and chain. He said "I did not do it by myself, there were two more men with me". On 12th July Supt. Thoresby received Upton into his custody at Louth, and charged him with robbery. He was committed to take his trial at the October Sessions and held at Lincoln Gaol until then. He had had a previous conviction of larceny in 1870 (six years earlier), for stealing two tame fowl, for which he served 3 calendar months hard labour in Spilsby Gaol.

On 24th October 1876, George Upton pleaded guilty of larceny from the person, before Magistrate Cornelius Parker. He was sentenced to nine calendar months imprisonment with hard labour at the Lindsey Prison, Lincoln (now HMP Lincoln).

In past issues I have included a few sudoku games. A few people have asked me "what do I do"? To get you started, lets look at the 6th row down. Numbers 1 and 7 are missing. We cannot put 1 between 3 and 4 because there is already a 1 in that box and column, therefore it must go at the end next to the 9. The 7 then fills the gap between the 3 and 4. Also, the 7 could not go at the end because there is already a 7 in that box of nine. Continue the process to fill all the spaces. Good luck.

As mentioned in the christmas newsletter, I would like to include old photographs in and around Saltfleetby. As this is the spring edition we start with Mr Taylor of Thornham Farm holding a couple of spring lambs. During April 1984 Saltfleetby was invaded by a series of strange looking vehicles. The vehicles I believe, were being used by Rees Geophysics to take seismic readings in the area. As I understand, the large plate below the vehicle would lower on to the road at the same time lifting the wheels from the road surface. The plate would then vibrate sending pulses through the rock below. By all accounts, the vibrations felt today from passing lorries along Main Road bears little resemblance to the earthquake like vibrations sent out by these machines. The original building was built at ninety degrees to the road with the front extension being added around 1870. The house pictured was awaiting demolition around 1984 I understand. SOLAR SPEED SIGN RESULTS

The results printed on pages 38 and 39 cover a period from 24-08-2024 to 14-02-2025. Firstly I fully appreciate that when reproduced on an A5 page the details are difficult to read. If you wish to receive a better clear copy of the results by email, please send your request to me,

and I shall be pleased to forward them on to you.

The following list depicts what colour relates to what speed; the quantity of that colour shows the percentage of that speed.

For example, if you look at the results for vehicles coming from Manby towards the speed sign at Marshlands, during the 6 month period listed, 180,891 vehicles passed that sign at 40 mph or less. That figure relates to over 93% of vehicles being within the speed limit of 40 mph. You will also notice that the speeds are recorded by each sign in both directions.



The village Speed Watch is in regular action throughout the village. New members are always welcome and full training is given.

The results clearly show that the signs do work but there is still work to be done in certain areas.

The speed watch teams, the police speed detector van and the unmarked police cars will continue to monitor the situation.

Speeding tickets have been issued in the past, please don't be the next one caught, in this instance, points definitely do not win prizes!
